PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

It's Time to Fly!

With Spring here, the Honor Flight Rochester season is underway with the first mission of 2017. Mission 52 took place April 8-9 with 45 veterans scheduled for the flight.

Honor Flight Rochester Volunteer of the Year: Tracey Reiter

Tracey Reiter was surprised when she was named the recipient of the Col. Woody Mench Award for 2016. "It's not something I would have expected," said Tracey. That's how it should be. Volunteers do what they do for the love of it and not the recognition.

Tracey is the essence of volunteerism. She always steps up when called upon by Honor Flight Rochester. Currently, she is the roster coordinator for HFR. But she's been a solo guardian, a veteran escort, a trip safety assistant, and has worked at both departures and homecomings. All while trying to fly under the radar. But she was detected.

The award – named for HFR co-founder Col. Edwin "Woody" Mench – is given

annually for exceptional volunteerism to HFR. This year's award was presented Jan. 21 at the HFR Volunteer Recognition event.

In nominating Tracey, HFR Vice President of Operations John Burns said: "Her work in 2016 coordinating the calls and scheduling of veterans went above and beyond. I can't remember a year in which we had so many challenges and I am not sure we could have pulled it off without the work that Tracey did. I think the thing that puts her over the top for me is her 'can do' attitude. Regardless of whatever Gina Ryan or I asked of her, she always responded: "I am on it" and then got smile."

HFR Health and Safety Coordinator Gina Ryan concurred. "Tracey managed to coordinate the roster for 300 veterans who are booked by 15 to 20 volunteer callers. She was inundated with texts messages, phone calls, and emails at all hours during 2016. Her commitment is truly humbling!"

HFR President Richard Stewart described her work as "Herculean."

Tracey and her husband, Steve, became involved in HFR after seeing a TV report on the Honor Flight Network one Memorial Day. "I was so moved, I knew that I wanted to help," said Tracey, a daughter and granddaughter of veterans. She searched the internet, found HFR, and filled out guardian applications for her and Steve.

Mission 51 Through the Eyes of Richard Randall

Richard Randall of Geneseo, a retired eye doctor, flew on Honor Flight Rochester Mission 51 with his stepdaughter, Kimberly Burgess, of Groveland, as his guardian. Here is his account of the trip, also published in the *Livingston County News*.

Upon arrival at BWI Airport, we proceeded through a line of hundreds of welcoming persons that included a band, other travelers, perhaps 50 or so uniformed Midshipmen from the U.S. Naval Academy, men and women dressed in uniforms from World Wars I and II, Korean and other wars standing at attention, U.S. flags everywhere. Each greeter, civilian or military, gently spoke the words 'Thank you for your service' to each of us as we proceeded down the airport



corridor. Some saluted us as we passed by. I saw many Honor Flight veterans wipe tears from their eyes as a result of the tremendous support. Yes, I was one of them who tried, but was unable to hold back the tears.

After boarding one of three firstclass chartered tour buses at BWI, a group of Patriot Guard Riders (PGR) escorted the buses from the airport on their motorcycles to the Washington Memorials. I used to think of PGR as a group of rather roughshod, bearded men that you wanted to steer clear of, but I quickly discovered Patriot Guard Riders actually are respected 100% Americans, men and women who would really "have your back" at all times. They are truly friends of military veterans and their families, ready to help at any time if the need arises.

We visited the World War II Memorial first. As we disembarked from our bus, our guardian and multiple Honor Flight staff and volunteers were right there offering assistance and guidance as needed by each veteran guest. After reboarding our buses we were on to the Korean, Lincoln, and Vietnam Memorials. Next was a bus trip to the Air Force Memorial and lunch.

After lunch we were off to Arlington National Cemetery and the Changing of the Guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. We were escorted to front line spaces at the Tomb where we had a fantastic view of the event. Again, it brought tears to many of us, including me, as we watched the precision and dedication of the Tomb guard soldiers.

Immediately afterwards, we were escorted to a nearby area where a member of the Tomb's guards spoke to us and answered our questions. Did you know they are required to spend six hours polishing their shoes each day while on duty? The private meeting with the guard was a treat not shared with visitors in general. From there we were on our way to the Women in Service Memorial, which I didn't know existed, and finally a visit to the Iwo Jima-Marines Memorial.

That evening we enjoyed a banquet and socializing at the BWI Hilton Hotel. I had an opportunity to talk with the only female veteran guest with us, 1st Lieutenant Ginny Stocks, a World War II veteran and Army nurse. I believe she said she was 94 years old, and it was my honor and pleasure to meet her. Next morning, we were served breakfast at the hotel and then on to the airport for our Southwest flight to Rochester.

When we arrived at the Rochester airport we were again overwhelmed and awed by the tremendous reception we received as Honor Flight guests. There were hundreds and hundreds of family members, fellow air travelers, children, uniformed military personnel, a band, Patriot Guard Riders, all standing in a line, greeting us with, 'Thank you for your service' and often a salute.

Each of us on our Mission 51, guest veterans, guardians, staff and volunteers were overwhelmed with our special Honor Flight experience. Ordinary words cannot express how we felt or shed tears, only words from the heart would suffice. All of the guest veterans' expenses, airfare, hotel, meals, etc. were paid for by Honor Flight Rochester and their financial supporters. We were not allowed to spend any money for anything during the trip, personal souvenirs excepted. Thank you, fellow Americans, from the bottom of my heart for a once in a lifetime experience.
