Battle of the Bulge 70th Anniversary Trip

Two of our HFR veterans, Jack Foy (right) and Peter DuPre ("Harmonic Pete") recently traveled to Europe with The Greatest Generations Foundation in honor of the 70th anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge. The U.S. lost 19,000 servicemen during the forty day battle.

Jack (right) and Pete (below) were able to visit many areas including the Belgian town of Tillet (west of Bastogne) where Jack's unit had its heaviest fighting. Several of the children Jack met there told him "My grandfather told me about you guys".





troduced to the King and Queen of Belgium. They visited the museum in Bastogne and participated in ceremonies honoring their fallen comrades. Pete and Jack visited Hamm Cemetery where Gen. Patton and more than 5,000 American soldiers are buried. They were also awarded Luxembourg's Legion of Honor medals.

They also participated in a memorial service at the site of the Malmédy Massacre, where 81 unarmed

American POWs from Battery B of the 285th Field Artillery Observation Battalion were shot and bludgeoned in the worst atrocity of the war in Europe. During the service, Jack said a prayer and Pete played *Amazing Grace* on his harmonica.

When a female veteran's guardian could not travel at the last minute, Jen volunteered—despite not having so much as a toothbrush to take with her—so that the veteran could still go. After that experience, Jen decided to keep a "go bag" in her car, and her preparation paid off on Mission 24. Jen says that both trips were unexpected but still very enjoyable.





In 2009, Jen saw a "Volunteers Needed" ad by HFR in the newspaper so she signed up to help out at Welcome Homes. She had just gotten married and was transitioning from being a television news director to a new career as a teacher. Jen now coordinates Welcome Homes with Pat Mason, whom she describes as "a very hard worker who



always gets people the posts that they want". According to her, "Pat is a lot of fun and keeps me laughing". Jen oversees Welcome Home and schedules everything that happens in the International Room (M.C., bands, speakers, etc.) and "always goes to the gate to welcome the veterans—it is my favorite part".

In addition to her work on Welcome Home and Departure, Jen takes tons of photos for HFR, participates in our Speakers Bureau, and volunteers for various ground events. She says that her favorite part of volunteering for HFR is the veterans, and adds that "being around them is magical"
