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#### Tom Hope Receives Congressional Gold Medal

HFR veteran Thomas W. Hope, who was profiled in our December 2014 newsletter, and Rochester native Thomas W. Johnson were awarded the Congressional Gold Medal to honor their contributions to the country during WWII. The Gold Medal is the highest civilian honor given by the U.S. government.

The ceremony was held on February 3<sup>rd</sup> in the Capitol. Both men were members of the First Special Service Force which was assembled in 1942 with soldiers from both the U.S. and Canada and was the predecessor to today's special forces units. The 1,800 soldier unit accounted for 12,000 German casualties and captured 7,000 prisoners and was nicknamed the "Black Devils" by the Nazis. They were also known as the "Devils Brigade" and inspired the film of the same name.

Only about 75 members of the unit are still living, including Tom Hope, who attended the ceremony along with his three sons. News 8 quoted Tom "I was honored. As I look back now, the early part of the years after the war no one thanked us the way they do now. Even the kids do." The widow and children of Thomas Johnson attended the ceremony as well.

Gates—Chili Hike for Heroes Benefits Honor Flight Rochester

On Saturday March 21st, Gates-Chili Middle School hosted the Gates-Chili Hike for Heroes. Held annually, for the past 9 years this event has been conducted to benefit local veteran's organizations. This is the third consecutive year the Hike for Heroes has raised money for Honor Flight Rochester, this year raising enough to help us take 14 more of our veterans to Washington DC to see their memorials.

HFR Volunteer John Peckham attended the event and took the photos shown below. John had a great time at the event, and had the following to say of the Hike for Heroes:

"In my images, I tried to capture the energy and exuberance demonstrated by the students participating in the event. It seemed to me that students, veterans and Honor Flight Rochester Volunteers all had a wonderful time ... It's inspiring that in a time where folks are so busy getting to whatever the next athletic/social/family event might be, that these young people dedicated so much time and effort to help make this a successful event. It's great to see our younger generation meet, appreciate and hear about history from men and women who participated in it."





## **Veteran Memories—George Haines**

George Haines feels very blessed to have survived two years of active combat without a scratch and adds "The man upstairs hasn't closed the book on me". George joined the Army when he was 17—his mother had to sign for him—and served for a total of three years, two of which were active duty. He traveled down the Mississippi River and then through the Panama Canal on his way to the Pacific Theater. His 34<sup>th</sup> Battalion was attached to the 24<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division and his first combat was on New Guinea. He was originally assigned to a bazooka but preferred being a scout (he rotated between first and second), and was once behind enemy lines for a couple of days. After New Guinea, the 34<sup>th</sup> fought on the Coral Islands and then led the assault on Leyte where they fought for 75 continuous days. George and his battalion also fought at Mindoro and Mindanao. After the war, George was stationed in Japan during the occupation. After his service, George drove a truck for Kodak for 35 years, mostly around Monroe County. He loved his job so much that he declined a promotion, and was proud to be number one on Kodak's entry clearance list when he retired.




George traveled on HFR Mission 30 in September of 2013 with his grandson Matt as his guardian (*above*). He has many fond memories of their trip including meeting many HFR volunteers, missing the group photo at the WWII Memorial because he was busy reading every inscription there, being interviewed as he was leaving the Memorial (Laurie Palmer found the video on Facebook and put it on a DVD for him), and ironically, waiting for his grandson to rest up after a long walk near the Lincoln, Korea, and Viet Nam Memorials. His favorite memory of his trip was receiving 5 letters from students during "Mail Call" and he answered every one of those letters.



George says that he fell in love with all of it during his trip and afterwards he told himself "You have time to give and you're capable of doing it!" Unsure of how to get started, he went to the next Homecoming to greet returning veterans and then submitted a volunteer application. George says he "can't do enough" and is "willing to go anywhere", so it was much

easier to find photos of George volunteering with HFR than of his trip with us! George works at both Departures and Homecomings

and attends many Ground and Speakers Bureau Events. When he is not busy helping HFR, George works three days a week in the Emergency Room at Park Ridge Hospital for which he received Lifespan's "Volunteer of the Year" Award for Monroe County in 2014. Not one to sit idle, George multitasks at home, using a pedal exerciser while he makes his flags and watches tv.

## A Message from Rich

The excitement of the flying season is upon us. This year we have scheduled six missions with three in the Spring and three in the Fall. Our first will be Mission #40 and will take place on the weekend of May  $2^{nd}$  &  $3^{rd}$ . In many ways the 2015 missions will mirror the previous flights and be the culmination of what we have learned. Simply stated we want more veterans to have the best possible experience on their Honor Flight.

As you may know, Honor Flight Rochester continues to be very active with outreach into the community. Much of this is done through our Speakers Bureau and Events programs. Our Speakers Bureau is well known and welcomes the opportunity to tell the Honor Flight story at civic organizations meetings, senior citizen homes, and similar venues where there is an interest in veterans. Almost every speaking engagement



generates applications for veterans, guardians and volunteers. Depending on the audience, we frequently receive donations. Speakers Bureau engagements take place year round.

Another effective outreach is our involvement with Events hosted by others for the benefit of HFR. So far this year we have participated with our presence at the Hike for Heroes at the Gates Chili Middle School on March 21<sup>st</sup> and the Rochester Home and Garden Show at the Convention Center on March 21<sup>st</sup> & 22<sup>nd</sup>. These events are greatly appreciated and generated significant funding to send our veterans to Washington, D.C. Between now and September we look forward to more than a dozen of these types of events which include air shows, golf tournaments, runs/hikes, plays, concerts, trade shows, fairs, social gatherings and more. Please be on the lookout in our newsletter, website and Facebook for their dates. Most are open to the public and I encourage your attendance. I hope to see you at some of our upcoming events including the Knighthawks Lacrosse Military Appreciation Night on April 25<sup>th</sup> at the Blue Cross Arena and the Pianofest on May 23<sup>rd</sup> at the Kodak Center for the Performing Arts where hundreds of Rochester piano students with dozens of pianos on stage will perform an all patriotic concert. This is a first time event and sponsored by the Rochester Piano Teachers' Guild. Also, this past February once again we participated in the Honor Flight Network Summit in Baltimore. Representing the Rochester hub were John Burns, Vice President of Operations, Frank Vavrick, Secretary/Treasurer, Larry Strassner Speakers Bureau/Events and myself. In total there were 347 attendees. This was a weekend of teambuilding and mentorship with seminars and presentations. Our Rochester reputation is such that other hubs seek us out for our advice on how to do things right. Presently there are 133 hubs covering 42 states. Since 2005, a total of 133,817 veterans have taken their Honor Flight. Of this 1807 were from the Rochester hub.

Finally I would like to mention our wonderful Volunteer Kick-Off on March 25<sup>th</sup> at the American Legion Post 468 in Greece. Our intent that evening was to provide information on our volunteer opportunities. The Kick-Off did this very well.
