Battle of the Bulge Memorial Day Ceremony

On Memorial Day, May 25, 2015 a special Battle of the Bulge Memorial Ceremony was held at Ontario Beach Park in Charlotte. At the ceremony, three local veterans were honored for their service in WWII. John Cipolla of Greece, Anthony Nardone of Webster, and Jack Foy of Charlotte were all awarded the rank of Chevalier in the French Legion of Honor. This award, France's highest, was presented on behalf of French President Monsieur Francoise Hollande by French Consul Pascal Soares.

A Tribute to Dick Brookins

MEMORIAL DAY 2015



I was very fortunate this past year. I was able to travel to our old battle grounds in Europe -twice. First in June to the invasion beaches of Normandy for the 70th anniversary of D-Day,

and then again in December to Belgium and Luxembourg for the 70th Anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge. There were 20 men in our group sponsored by the Greatest Generation Foundation.

We were treated with great respect and honor wherever we went. We were the first to board airline flights, and anywhere there was a line we were sent through first, -- people stood and clapped as we went by.

It was very emotional visiting the places we fought 70 years ago and remembering all the comrades we lost there. "My machine gun foxhole was over there -- Harvey was killed there, -- Finn, West and Porzio were killed over there," -- it was very hard.

There was one thing that really surprised me. I became very famous in the small towns of Luxembourg. Not because of anything I did, but because of a friend I have.

Our first stop in Luxembourg was the large American cemetery in Hamm where thousands of the American soldiers Killed in Action in the Battle of the Bulge are buried. Some of us were awarded the Luxembourg Legion of Honor by the officials. I was the first one called up, --- as they told me --- because they were ordered to by a very important person --- Saint Nicholas --- otherwise known as Dick Brookins. He had been there a week or so before, at the invitation of the people of Wiltz, and he knew that I was coming over. Most of you know of Dick's experience as St. Nicholas in the town of Wiltz in early December 1944. It

was such a beautiful and wonderful experience for the people of Wiltz in the midst of the horrors of war. Dick was chosen by the men of his 28th Infantry Division unit to play St. Nicholas for the children of the town. It was such a beautiful and peaceful affair in the middle of a horrible war that it made the news and the theater News Reels of the day. There was even a book written **about it, "The American St. Nick".** After the war the people of Wiltz found Dick again and have invited him back several times. They even love him so much they put a statue of him in the town square.

Everwhere I went the call went out "This guy is a friend of Dick Brookins," and I immediately became a very important person in those towns, even in the nearby city of Bastogne.

As an American veteran of the war in Europe, (there aren't many of us left), I met many important people -- I had tea with the Queen of England -- shook hands with the President of France, --- sat by the President of the U.S. at the Omaha Beach D-Day ceremony, -- was greeted by the King and Queen of Belgium at the end of a snowy parade in Bastogne -- had lunch with them and a nice talk -- but all this paled when compared with knowing and being a friend of Dick Brookins. Many of us have been on



the TV and the news -- but Dick !! -- a statue in the town square!!

I want you to know that Dick is also a very important person in our town right here. He was the prime mover in establishing our local chapter of the Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge about 20 years ago with the help of a couple of other veterans.

SO -- on behalf of all your fellow Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge assembled here and those who are unable to be here --THANK YOU DICK!!

Peter Glennon Honored

Air Force veteran, and Honor Flight Rochester co-founder, Maj. Peter Glennon was presented the Lord Howard Award, and honor bestowed by the Naval Reserve Officers' Mess (NROM) during a ceremony that took place at the Rochester Yacht Club on June 5, 2015. Peter was chosen as recipient of the Lord Howard Award due to his role in helping establish Honor Flight Rochester, as well as his continued support and leadership within the organization. A description of the award and certificate can be seen below.

The Lord Howard Award

The Naval Reserve Officers Mess Lord Howard Award is named for the Lords Howard of British Naval fame, the first of which was Sir Edward Howard, Admiral of England. He distinguished himself in the war with France and Spain. He died in battle at sea in 1513. He was the mastermind behind Henry VIII's successful navy.

The Howard clan served with distinction. Their relatives included Queen Katherine Howard, Queen Ann Boleyn, Queen Elizabeth I, and Lord Charles Howard, who was the Lord High Admiral of England during the battle with the Spanish Armada in 1588. His use of the fouled anchor design led to it being used on most cap badges of Navies worldwide.

The Lord Howard Award is made in recognition of personal achievement and effort in support of the goals of the US Navy and its sister services and allies.



While the LORD HOWARD AWARD has a Naval service mura, it is also intended to recognize personal service and achievement in healf of the Navy's sinter services and allies. It is in this venue that we are pleased to effer recognition and praise to Peter Glennon, for his long service to the Air Force and Air National Guard, and particularly for his initiative as co-founder, application of legal shills in organizational structuring, and continuing leadership in the highly acclaimed program which hauors veterans of all armed forces: Honor Flight Rochester.

World War II and Korean War veterans, many with limited mobility or capacity to personally visit Memorials to these conflicts by the time they were erected in the nation's Capital, and their trained escort Guardians, have uniformly affered high praise for the personal enjoyment and enrichment gained from their Flights, the exceptionally effective management of travel and accommodations, and the synergistic energy, warmth, and expressions of gratitude and honer reflected, without hint of patronization, from the hage cadre of volumeters at all points.

Honor Flight is a nation-wide program. And Honor Flight Rochester participants, juxtapezed with Honor Flight groups from a host of other cities and states at Momerials on the Mall, in the Baltimere Airpect, and in the overnight hotel, clearly sense that their group stands out as a model in terms of appearance, demeanor, and management.

To Major Peter Glennon, for his role in founding and his ongoing participation in support of Honor Flight Rochester, we offer warm gratitude and a hearty Bravo Zulu in presenting him with our LORD HOWARD AWARD.

Veteran Memories-Michael (Mike) Perri

Michael (Mike) Perri was drafted by the U.S. Army many times but kept getting rejected because of his poor vision. Instead, he contributed to the war effort by building military parts at Kodak. Eventually the Army started calling up "limited service" draftees and he served from 1945 to 1947 as company clerk to his unit at three different bases in New Jersey. While there, he processed officers' discharges and later went to Ft. Dupont in Delaware to help close that down.

After leaving the Army, Mike went back to Kodak and stayed there until he retired 41½ years later. He worked in the Camera Works and did buffing and plating in Metal Works. In retrospect, Mike says "We didn't realize how great we had it at Kodak back then." Mike and his late wife Mary were married for 54 years and have three grown daughters. One daughter, Janice, lives in this area and the other two live in Nashville.

Several of Mike's friends had traveled on Honor Flight Rochester missions and kept after him to go. Eventually, he asked Janice to get an application for him, and they flew together on Mission 15, April 9-10, 2011. Unfortunately the weather was not very cooperative during their mission.



It rained so hard after the WWII Memorial that most veterans didn't get off the bus at the other memorials—except for one veteran who insisted on having his picture taken at each stop. A pilot car took the veterans around Arlington Cemetery, but they were unable to see the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown.

Despite the poor weather, Mike had a great time on his trip and found it difficult to single out one favorite part. He exclaimed, "the whole thing was my favorite." He did talk about the great reception they received at BWI, kids on bicycles coming up and saying "thank you for your service" at the WWII Memorial, getting lots of time to talk with other veterans at the banquet, receiving letters during "mail call," and the fabulous welcome home in Rochester.

Mike has lived in the same home in Greece for 62 years. He laughed when I asked him the secret to his good health. Perhaps his secret lies in helping others. Mike volunteered at the blood unit of the Red Cross for 17 years, working at blood drives including the ones at Kodak. His late wife Mary was a patient at the nursing home at St. John's before she passed away in 2004. After losing her, Mike began volunteering there in various roles such as working in the gift shop and providing transportation. He still volunteers there once per week in their café and is sometimes called upon for special events or to cover the gift shop. Mike says he enjoys seeing many people he met during his wife's stav.



After his Honor Flight trip, Mike wanted to ensure the same warm welcome for future veterans returning from their missions, so he and Janice signed up as volunteers. They participate in Welcome Homes, Ground Events, and Speakers Bureau.
