VETERAN MEMORIAL SPOTLIGHT:

David Hanning

David Hanning's family lived in a log cabin near Moody's Pond outside Saranac Lake, New York, when he was born. He was drafted into the Army upon graduation from high school in 1945. During basic training, which was quite severe (e.g., they had to dig foxholes while a tank came down the line firing live ammo), he saw a notice asking for volunteers to apply to become interpreters. This was appealing to David since he had lived in Montreal for a time during his childhood, so he applied and was sent to Yale University to begin learning Japanese. It was a 12 hours per day, six days per week total immersion program.

After four months of training, he was sent to Japan (where the war had just ended) to act as a translator between the American occupation force and Japanese civilians. He was first attached to an engineering battalion with the 24th Infantry Division on Honshu whose objective was to destroy Japanese fortifications and armaments. About 90% of the workers were Japanese and David says relationships were very tense. Later, he was sent to the island of Kyushu where his job was primarily as a peacekeeper. David was housed in a former armory which had avoided bombing because its roughly 30 buildings

were all linked together and had rooftop gardens, making it look like farmland from the air. They tried to send some machinery from the armory to South Korea as war reparations but the Soviet Union confiscated it for North Korea.

By the time David was sent back to the U.S. in January 1946, he was a staff sergeant. They landed at Ft. Lawson and he boarded a train back to Ft. Dix for his discharge. He was encouraged to join the reserves to preserve his rank, and he retired after 32 years in the Army as Lt. Colonel of the 98th Infantry Division in Rochester (now the 98th Training Division based at Ft. Benning).

After his regular Army discharge, David attended Paul Smith's College for two years and worked summers for the NY State Conservation Department (now DEC) as a conservationist where he helped fight forest fires, etc. He later attended St. Lawrence University and graduated in 1951 with a degree in Chinese History. David was on the ski team at both colleges—as he puts it, he "loved and lived for skiing". He also served on the Ski Patrol at local ski areas for many decades.

Upon graduation, David applied to Eastman Kodak which was looking to hire engineers. While he was not an engineer, his experience before being drafted led them to give him an engineering slot. He moved to Rochester and later retired from Kodak as a unit director.

David traveled to DC with HFR on M21 in April of 2012. His son Stephen was his guardian. David particularly enjoyed seeing the architecture of the buildings in DC as his father was an architect. He also enjoyed traveling to New Orleans to see the WWII Museum with Gary Sinise's Soaring Valor Foundation.



David passed in July. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family and friends.
